<u>The Tribe of Benjamin</u> (Two Year Old Classroom 24months – 36months)

"Benjamin - Son of My Right Hand"

The Two Year Old Classroom is designed to meet the expanding needs of our young learners. Our basic goal for toddlers is to provide developmentally appropriate activities, which encourage spiritual, social, emotional, physical and language development.

Ample opportunities are given for solitary and parallel play, which leads to cooperative play. Activities are also planned to enhance large and small muscle development. Selfhelp skills and toilet training are a very important part of the daily program.

In addition to our daily A-Beka Curriculum, your child will experience activities such as finger painting, book reading, storytelling, singing, dancing, and exploring outside.

- Motor Skill Development outdoor games, dancing, movement.
- Language Development recognizing and forming letters, story time, speech.
- Sensory Development textures, understanding the senses, descriptive activities.
- Imaginative Development arts and crafts, dramatic play, storytelling.
- Social Development large- and small-group activities, sharing, politeness.

This classroom will participate in our enrichment program Movement & Music, exercise planned and designed for toddler bodies. Because children are always exploring and moving, our classroom is designed for active play. There are activity centers to explore which include housekeeping, art, fine motor activities, book corners, blocks, and cars.

Our center provides developmentally appropriate learning areas for our classroom. The following are the learning areas and activities in the Two Year Old Room:

Self Help Skills: We will help your child throughout the day to learn to clean up after activities and work on self-help skills whenever possible and appropriate throughout your child's day.

Art: Many materials are provided for the children to allow them to be individually creative. Some of the supplies are; chalk, paint, glue, markers, play dough, shaving cream, crayons and more! Children are encouraged to express themselves creatively.

Music: Music time includes playing rhythm instruments, singing songs and dancing to music.

Story-Time: Stories may be told by reading books and making up stories. Our favorite stories are about Jesus!

Manipulative Area: Puzzles, stringing toys, and various other games are among the options in our manipulative area.

Dramatic Play: We play dress up, have telephone talks, play with babies and do a lot of pretend cooking! (Teachers set up dramatic play to encourage social skills and role playing while also learning a variety of other skills).

Outdoor Play: Outdoor play is a special part of our child's day. Fresh air and exercise are important to your child's health and to the curriculum. Gross motor development is supported through our outdoor playground. Outside we have climbers, slides, and great space for running around. Fine motor activities develop eye-hand coordination and finger/hand muscle strength.

Science: Science is explored all through the day in a multitude of ways. Children will take a nature walks, learn about animal habitats, or plant a seed.

Math: Goals for math include shape recognition, object matching, counting, and categorizing and sorting, quantitative skills, sequencing, and 1:1 correspondence. We achieve these goals through calendar, puzzles, blocks, pattern blocks, beads, and much more.

Language Development: Through daily stories, Bible verses, songs, finger plays, as well as conversational interactions, we support language development.

Social/Emotional Development: Our staff is committed to making each child feel welcomed and loved in their classroom. This helps foster proper self-esteem and pier friendships, which lead to a fun learning environment!

Spiritual Development: Bible stories are taught every morning, as well as weekly memory verses. Teachers help the children to apply what they've learned throughout the day. Bible verses and concepts are referenced when correcting a child's behavior. Every day we strive to show the children we love them, but most importantly, Jesus loves them!

CURRICULUM

The A Beka Curriculum and textbooks are built on the foundation of Academic Excellence and Christian Character Training. Circle Time

Circle Time provides a framework in which language, cognitive, and social skills can develop naturally. During circle time children have the opportunity to communicate with others by asking and answering questions; participating in songs, stories and other forms of expression. They experience patience, taking turns within other children and positive interaction with teachers who listen and respond to them.

Families

- We take the idea of a partnership with our families very seriously. It is only
 through the strong partnership of the home and the school that a child can have
 the richest preschool experience.
- Parents are encouraged to read the class and school newsletter so they can
 better discuss with the children the different topics they are studying. In
 addition, each child has a specific learning style, strengths and areas of growth.
 When a child receives the same messages and consistent support from both
 home and school, there is a greater possibility of success for the child.
- Parents are invited to school and class celebrations and events so that the home/school connection is strengthened.
- Communication is essential to a strong home/school relationship. Teachers can be available throughout the week to speak to parent, if either the parent(s) or the teacher has concerns

Day to Day

- Each child will be provided a communication folder for the school year. This folder is sent home daily and is expected to return the next school day. Your child's teacher(s) will use the folder to inform you of your child's day with the following information:
 - class activities (seat & art work)
 - o child's behavior
 - eating and resting times
 - potty & diaper changes (nursery T2)

This folder will also communicate upcoming events and any classroom needs.

Messages / Newsletters

- Messages to Director, Office Personnel, or Teachers in writing: Messages can be sent via communication folder, hand delivered or placed in office drop box.
- The parent bulletin board & information station (located at the end of the sign-in table) contain items pertaining to fundraisers, conferences, parent involvement, general information, and many other items we feel may be of interest to you.
- A bi-monthly newsletter will be published and placed at the information station
 - Located outside of the PromiseTown Office

Parent Evaluations

Parent Evaluations will be sent home during the school year. Please fill out these
evaluations as honestly as possible. We take your feedback seriously and use it
to help grow and enhance our program.

Parent Teacher Conferences

 We encourage parents and teachers to keep open lines of communication throughout the school year. Parent Teacher Conferences are scheduled once a year. See the 2013-2014 preschool calendars for scheduled time periods. Parents or teachers may request additional informal conferences if necessary.

Assessments & Screening

Each child will be administered the Early Childhood Developmental Assessment- Head Start Guidelines and the Early Childhood Developmental Screening – Ages & Stages Questionnaires twice per year in the infant and toddler rooms and once per year in the preschool. These tools along with observation and portfolio collection will be used to guide your child's development. Information collected will be available to parents upon request and for use at conference time.

- An assessments interprets a child's development overtime, and uses many different methods to gather information
- A **screening** is a tool to evaluate a child's development, using pre-determined criteria for a "snapshot" of development.
- Why Assessments & Screenings?
 - These processes identify the areas of strength of each child.
 - They reduce the number of children who may be "falling through the cracks"
 - Allow providers to use results for intentional planning and accurate/appropriate referrals for early intervention.

Child Discipline Policy

Child training and discipline are to be handled with kindness, understanding, and in accordance with Christian principles as set forth in the Scriptures. Believing that discipline is necessary for the welfare of the child, as well as the entire school, each teacher is given the responsibility of making and enforcing classroom and playground regulations. A positive environment is important to stimulate positive behavior and a good self-image.

- Policy for Discipline Problems
 - Warning appropriate to the situation will be given to stop the negative behavior
 - To avoid embarrassment, the child will be separated from the other children and talked with about his/her behavior.
 - o If negative behavior continues, the child will be separated from the group for a period of one (1) minute per year of the age of the child.
 - Not appropriate under 2 years
 - 2 years—2 minutes
 - 3 years—3 minutes
 - 4 years—4 minutes
 - Etc.
 - No child is to sit longer. "Time out" should only occur only in public places (ie: classrooms, eating areas, gym, or playgrounds).
- When discipline problems continue to disrupt the classroom and/or the daily routine of the Ministry, then following steps will be taken:
 - Parents will be involved in the situation by the way of daily reports, notes, phone calls, and/or meetings.
 - Parents will be called and will be expected to come to the school to discipline the child if the discipline problems continue.
 - If extreme problems still continue to exist, the parents will be given a two-week prior notice of the dismissal of their child. (This two-week notice may be waived, if the situation is deemed unmanageable.) The child will be dismissed for a period of up to three (3) weeks, or until the behavior has been corrected.
- Corporal punishment is prohibited at all times. Staff will be terminated for using corporal punishment. Any and all cases of corporal punishment observed must be reported to the PromiseTown Administration immediately.
- Parents will be asked to encourage their child, via positive reinforcement
 when they have demonstrated good behavior at school. Likewise, they will be
 encouraged to follow-up with their child at home for any negative behavior
 demonstrated at school. We will adopt the motto: "Celebrate what you want
 to see more of!" This means that we will encourage our children to display
 behavior that we want to continue.
